Seed potatoes and onion starts are here! The seed potatoes are only \$2.99/lb and we have seven organic varieties. Onion starts are \$1.99/lb, with two varieties available.

We also have a great selection of organic seeds from High Mowing Seeds and FEDCO, both based in New England.

We also have compost from Vermont Compost Company! Varieties available include: Fort Vee Potting Mix, Manure Compost, Compost Plus, and Jolly Roger.







Pansies are here! You can find them outside on our front porch. They come from Four Springs Farms in South Royalton, VT, where they're grown using organic practices in paper containers. The containers do have a fungicide within them, so they are not strictly organic.

Herb starts will come first, followed by veggie starts in a few weeks. We get these from a variety of different local farms, including Four Springs Farm, Root 5 Farm in Fairlee, and Blue Dragonfly Farm.

BOARD IN THE WILD NEIGHBORING FOOD CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATION'S ANNUAL MEETING

Every year, directors from our Board attend educational events within the co-op world, and this year is no different! In March, two of our directors attended the Neighboring Food Co-operative Association's Annual Meeting. NFCA is a co-operative federation bringing together more than 40 Food Co-ops and Startup initiatives across the Northeast. They are working toward a shared vision of a thriving co-operative economy, rooted in a healthy, just and sustainable regional food system and a vibrant community of co-operative enterprise.

Chris Sneddon tells us about one of the many conversations being held at the NFCA Annual Meeting: "One session I attended was focused on how farmers and cooperatives could better work on having an impact on food policies at the the sate and federal levels. Much of the discussion focused on how to amplify our collective voice through organizations such as NFCA. We heard from representatives of the New England Famers' Union and the Hanover Co-op Food Stores about how food coops can have a real impact on our political system by doing things as simple as communicating with state and federal legislators regarding food and sustainability policies. Given the upcoming 2024 national elections, some key questions for coops and their members include how can we support civic engagement, and how can we engage legislators effectively."
